Status of State Appropriations Requests and Considerations

The Office of the City Manager is pleased to report that each of the City of Delray Beach's state appropriations requests have been included in the Florida Legislature's approved budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

As referenced in the attached electronic mail message from lobbyist Mat Forrest, the remaining hurdle involves securing Governor DeSantis' approval as noted. The Office of the Governor currently has ample time to consider final approval or veto options.

Direction is being offered to secure external support for our efforts, including community engagements and other activities to bolters the importance of respective project funding. Major initiatives and outcomes to this effect include allocations for the Pompey Park Improvements Program, the Catherine Strong Park Improvements Program, and the Thomas Street Stormwater Pump Station Improvement Program.

Current Trajectory Involving Boca Raton Museum of Art Collaboration

Since the March 1st City Commission meeting announcement concerning the City of Delray Beach's pending collaboration with the Boca Raton Museum of Art (BRMA) to support cultural and artistic activities at the Old School Square campus, all involved are pleased about the current trajectory. Progress to date involves compilation of a management and operating agreement to govern the relationship, including facility usage and program budget considerations, as well as logistics related to initial exhibitions.

Once the details have been finalized and the agreement has been executed (anticipated during the next couple weeks or so), information relative to their grand opening and cultural programming will be available. Meanwhile, City

leadership will continue to meet with BRMA representatives and the various internal departments to prepare for a smooth transition.

Agreement Considerations Regarding Community Land Trust

With the Office of the City Manager and leadership of the Department of Neighborhood and Community Services having recently spent time with representatives of the Delray Beach Community Land Trust (CLT) to ascertain a vision for various community development related initiatives, please be advised that interests exist to develop property currently owned by the City of Delray Beach located on Southwest 12th Avenue.

As referenced in the attached notification letter from CLT Board President Herman Stevens, Jr., interests to this effect involves development and construction of both office and housing opportunities in the area that would otherwise not become available.

Given the complexities of land and financial transactions, arrangements are being made to host a workshop meeting on the subject via the June 14th session. A property survey and other technical data exercises will be performed to enable the City Commission to review all relevant information and provide direction accordingly.

Considerations Regarding Landscape Irrigation Ordinance

Palm Beach County recently adopted a year-round landscape irrigation ordinance to help conserve regional water supply. Many other municipalities in the region have also approved similar measures and requirements. Since Director of Utilities Hassan Hadjimiry joined our organization in June 2020, he has paid close attention to the evolution of such practices in neighboring cities, to the point that we are now at liberty to offer such considerations for our community.

The attached PowerPoint presentation summarizes the merits accordingly, including proposed scheduling activities, and specific rationale relative to conversation efforts vis-à-vis fluctuations in rainfall activity.

A public presentation as outlined will be offered during the April 12th workshop meeting, to include ancillary education, as well as an opportunity for the City Commission to offer consensus accordingly.

Calendar of Meetings, Activities, and Functions

As I continue to engage and connect with various community interests and constituency citywide, I've had several additional opportunities to do during the past couple weeks. For instance, I participated in an Elders Table dialogue last week at Community Primitive Baptist Church on 11th Avenue. Attendance and interaction as noted offered me a more intimate orientation relative to infrastructure, community development, and a myriad of neighborhood issues in the Northwest/Southwest areas of Delray Beach. Inclusion of thoughts and considerations resulting from this exercise will likewise be offered as city administration works to advance respective improvement initiatives.

I will also serve as the keynote speaker for tomorrow's Palm Trail Homeowners Association annual meeting. Similar to the experience I offered during the December 15, 2021, Beach Property Owners Association annual membership meeting, I plan to highlight goals, objectives, outcomes, and list a record of achievements since my arrival to Delray Beach last summer, as well as address specific issues of concern impacting the immediate vicinity such as low wake zone policy considerations, traffic mitigating planning, and thoughts regarding tree overlay districting.

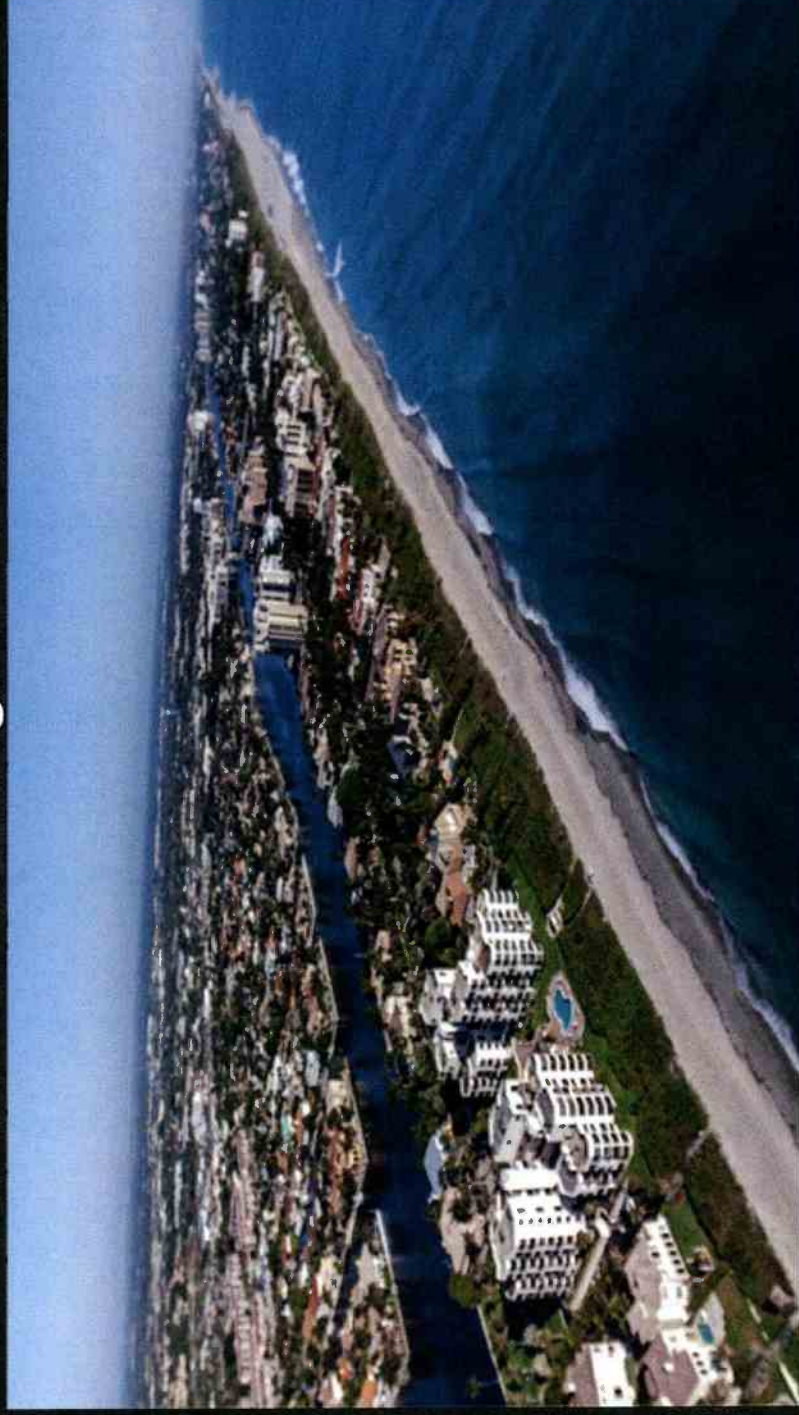

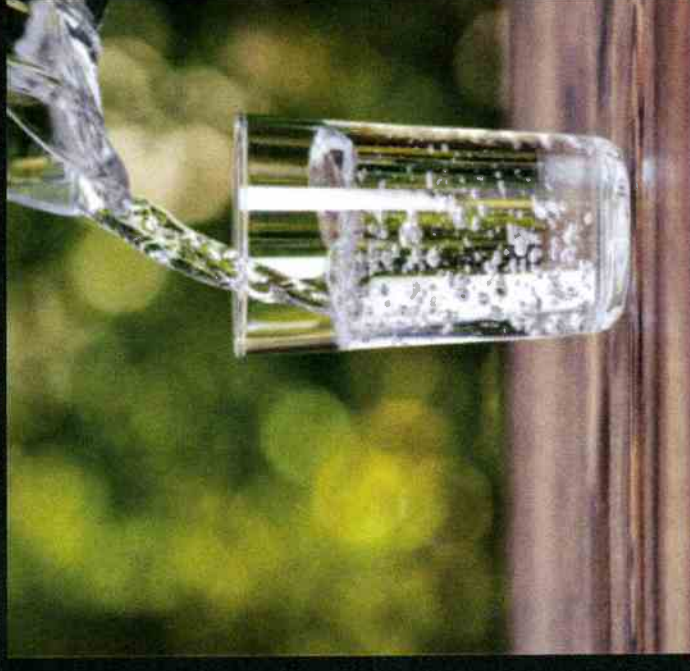

Purpose

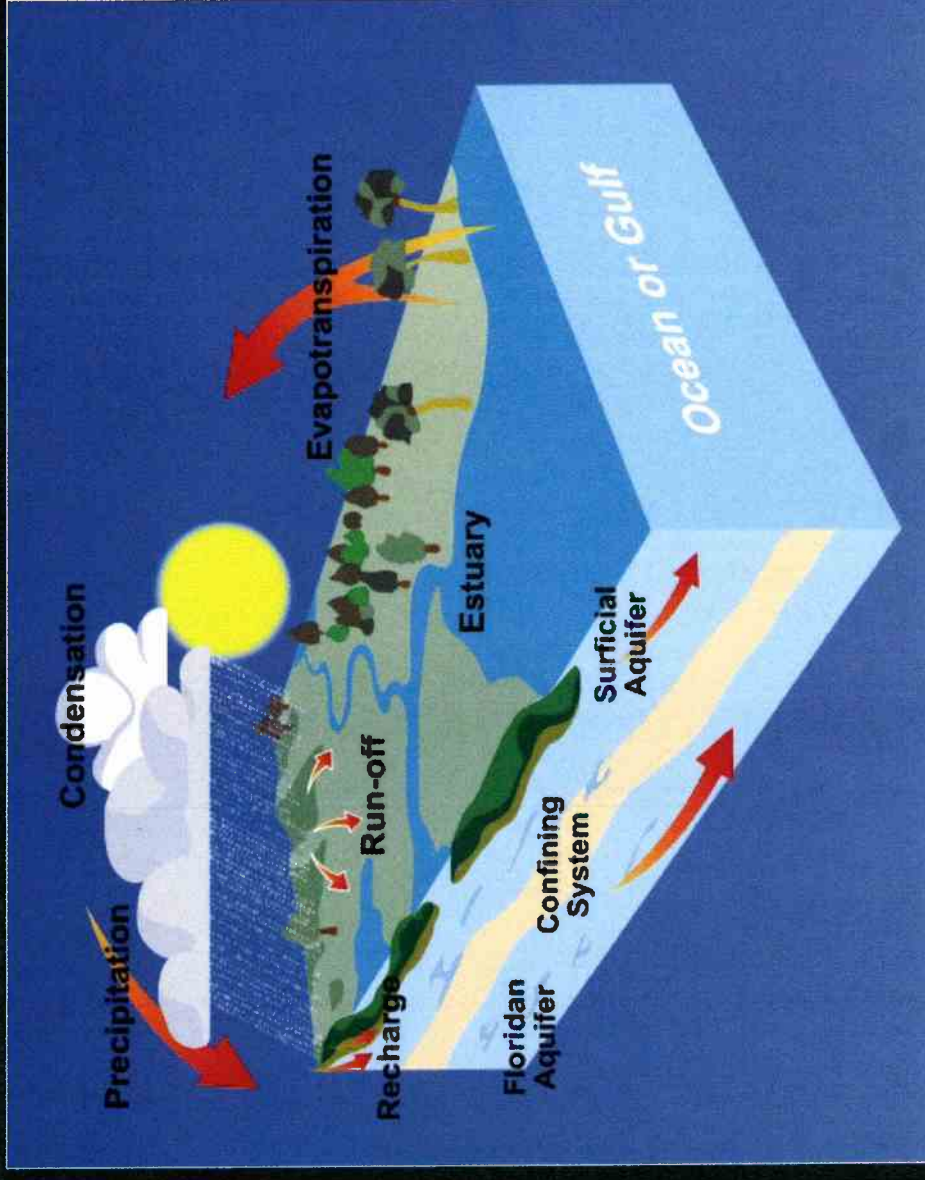


- Fresh groundwater is the highest quality potable water source in Palm Beach County and especially in the City of Delray Beach. In order to provide for the safe and prudent use of this limited and valuable resource, the City of Delray Beach must take the necessary steps to implement year-round irrigation measures.
- The intent of the City of Delray Beach Commissioners is to set forth uniform, citywide water conservation principles to promote a reduction of water use through conservation, education, economic incentives, and regulatory processes.

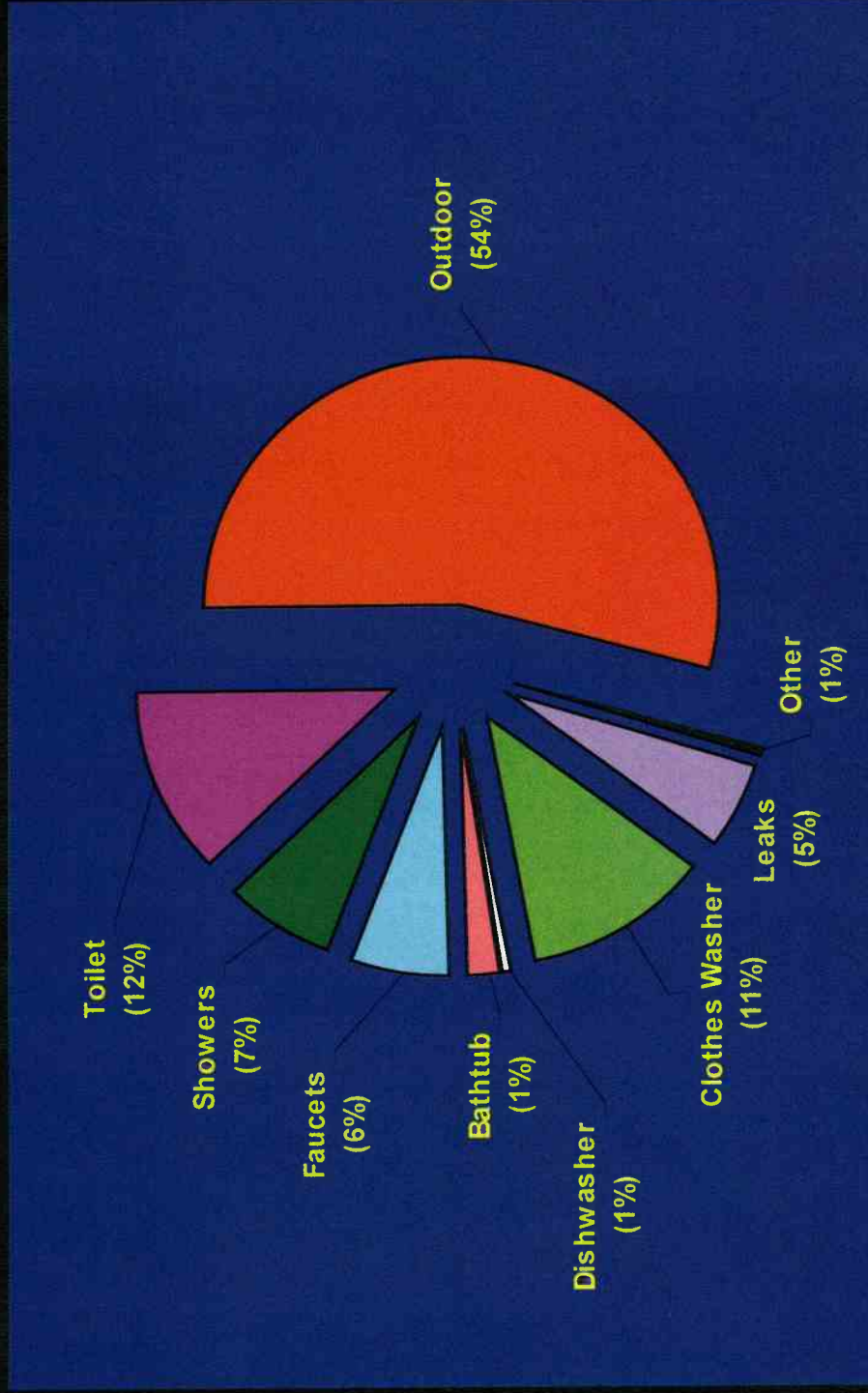


Our Water Supply Comes From Rain

- Average of 52 inches of rain per year
- 70% of annual rain falls during summer
- Replenishes lakes and underground aquifers
- Almost 45 inches "lost" to evaporation and transpiration

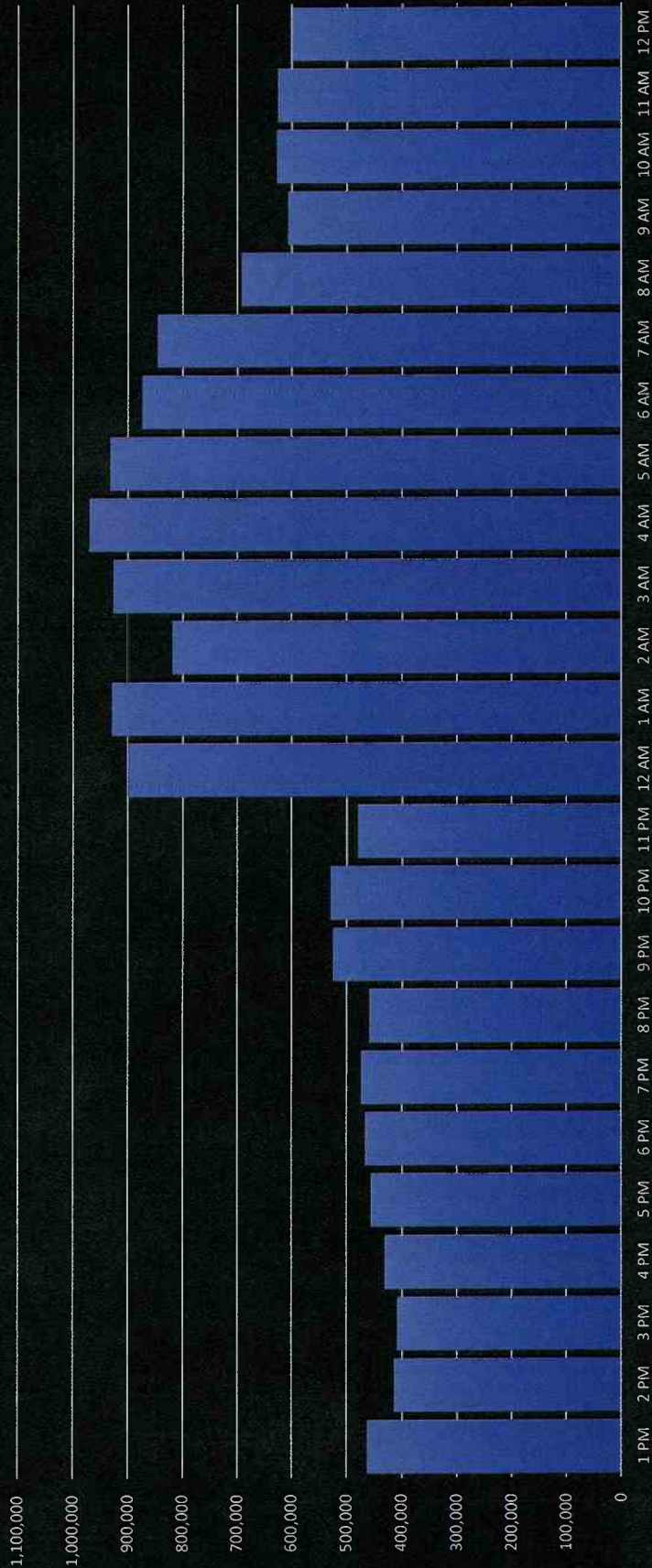


Typical Water Use Profile

Restrictions

The use of water for the irrigation of lawns, landscaped areas, golf courses or other outdoor vegetation in the city is restricted as follows:

- a) No watering on Friday, and only between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Saturday through Thursday.
- b) Water use between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m. Saturday through Thursday shall be limited to 3 days a week as follows:

- I. Property with odd-numbered addresses =====> Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.
- II. Property with even-numbered addresses =====> Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

Exceptions

Newly Landscaped Area



- Prior to and after planting on the day installed, anytime.
- First 30 days - M. T. W. Th. Sat. & Sunday between 4 PM and 10 AM.
- 31 to 90 day period - M. W. Th. and Saturday between 4 PM and 10 AM

Irrigation Maintenance and Repairs



- Irrigating system may be operated anytime with an attendant on site – limited to 10 minutes per zone

Applying Fertilizer, Insecticides, Pesticides, etc., as recommended



- During normal allowable watering days / times unless a professional applicator has posted sign containing required dates and times

Use of Low Volume Irrigation, hand watering, utilizing rain harvesting devices are allowed anytime and any day.





Implementation / Education

- *The City will provide a three (3) month trial/educational period upon effective date of the ordinance prior to imposing a first violation penalty. During this trial/education period anyone found in violation will receive written warning that a violation of the irrigation limits set forth in the ordinance will result in the owner being fined. A warning issued to an occupant of the premises will serve as proof of notice to the owner.*
- *In addition to social media posts, educational videos, and an extra newsletter article, city staff will be doing direct outreach utilizing informational door hangers placed directly on sites where there is watering outside of the allotted times. The first notice, a blue door hanger, will provide education to inform residents who may be unaware of the restrictions. A second notice, a yellow hanger, will act as a written warning and begin a formal enforcement process.*
- *No additional warning is required after the first violation warnings is given. A warning issued to an occupant of the premises acts as a proof of notice to the owner.*



Exceptions

- *This Ordinance applies to all use of water for irrigation regardless of source, except:*
 - *(a) reclaimed water may be utilized for irrigation purposes each day of the week from 4:00 p.m. through 10:00 a.m., and*
 - *(b) irrigation with reclaimed water by golf courses and athletic play areas shall be exempt from all days of the week and time restrictions.*

- *This Ordinance is superseded whenever the City Water Shortage Plan is in place*



Enforcement

Every City of Delray Beach Code Enforcement Officer/Police Officer having jurisdiction in the area governed by this Ordinance shall, in connection with all other duties imposed by law, diligently enforce the provisions of this section. In addition, the City Manager may also delegate enforcement responsibility for this section to other departments of city government.



Notice of Violation

Each day in violation of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be subject to the following penalties:

- *First violation not to exceed \$150.00.*
- *Second violation not to exceed \$500.00.*

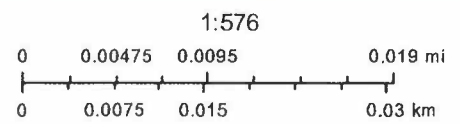
