WHAT IS CDBG?

Annual grant allocation from HUD to administer activities that preserve and develop viable communities principally benefiting low income households.

- Expand Economic Development Opportunities





ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES CAN BE GROUPED AS:

- Real Property and Housing-related activities:
 - Acquisition/Disposition of land and/or buildings
 - Clearance and Demolition
 - Homeownership Assistance, such as down payment assistance
 - Rehabilitation of Single-Family Properties
 - Code Enforcement
 - Historic Preservation
 - Lead-based paint testing, evaluation, reduction and clearance
- Public Facilities & Infrastructure:
 - Installation or construction of a public facility such as a park, homeless shelter, resource center etc.
 - Infrastructure improvement including the installation of sidewalks, road paving, and paving of alleyways and water/sewer system.

ALLOWABLE USES:

CDBG regulations allow the use of grant funds for a wide range of public service activities including, but not limited to:

- Child care
- Health care
- Job training
- Recreation programs
- Education programs
- Public safety services
- Fair housing activities

- Services for senior citizens
- Services for homeless persons
- Drug abuse counseling and treatment
- Energy conservation counseling and testing
- Homebuyer down payment assistance
- Emergency assistance payments
- Eligible operating expenses

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES:

- Funds in support of individual small businesses within the target area
 - Must create a full time position
- Funds in support of technical assistance to small businesses



PLANNING AND ADMINISTRATION:

- Preparation of general plans such as the Consolidated Plan
- Day to day management of housing-rehab program
- Oversight of neighborhood initiatives
- Management of environmental and historic preservation related issues
- Compliance with rules such as: Environmental Review Standards, Federal Labor Standards (Davis Bacon Act), Section 3 Requirements
- General Program Administration
 - Includes general management, office supplies, training, travel and salaries
 - Includes public information, indirect costs, and preparation of applications for federal funds

History of CDBG Expenditures:

Over the past twenty years, the City has received and allocated more than \$7.2 million dollars for various improvement projects in the target area. Listed below are some of the projects/ improvements we have completed with the use of CDBG funds:

- Housing Rehabilitation
- Infrastructure Improvements/Sidewalks
- Demolition and Clearance
- Public services agencies such as, Legal Aid Society, Milagro Center, Knights of Pythagoras Mentoring Network, Urban League and Achievement Centers for Children & Families.








Planning & Administration

\$ 106,227

 Providing for the overall administration of the CDBG Program and Neighborhood Services Division. Costs include staff and related expenses required for overall program management, coordination, monitoring, reporting and evaluation and Fair Housing Initiatives. These costs are subject to a statutory limitation of not more than 20% of the annual grant funds plus program income.

Public Services

\$ 79,670

 Funds in support of various eligible public service activities consistent with needs identified in the City's Five-Year Consolidated Plan and are subject to a 15% cap of annual allocation. All proposed activities serve low-moderate income persons.

PROPOSED USE OF FUNDS 2020-2021 \$531,136 CDBG ALLOCATION

ACTIVITY Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation PROPOSED AMOUNT \$ 346,064

 Providing for the substantial rehabilitation of owner-occupied residential homes. The primary goal of the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program is to enable income-eligible households to maintain a safe, habitable and suitable living environment. Cost also includes salaries and direct costs of operating rehab program.

City of Delray Beach Consolidated Plan Needs Assessment Survey Fiscal Years 2020-2024 A RAY BEAM

The City of Delray Beach is a direct grantee of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. In order to determine which eligible activities will best serve the needs of the community, a five-year Consolidated Plan and Consolidated Annual Plan is developed. This survey is intended to assess those priority needs for activities to be funded.

These CDBG funds are also leveraged with other federal and state programs.

The State Housing Initiative Program (SHIP) provides direct assistance to individuals to purchase housing, or to organizations that provide affordable housing for low-income households. These programs can provide down payment assistance for first-time homebuyers.

The Residential Construction Mitigation Program (RCMP) provides hurricane mitigation retrofit measures to owner-occupied properties which address code violation issues as well as standard housing rehabilitation. Delray Beach Community Redevelopment Agency provides funds to assist homeowners with the cost of minor structural and cosmetic property improvements.

The City's federally funded program is aimed to help low-income residents:

 The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) projects can be undertaken where more than 51% of the people in an area have incomes below 80% of the region's median family/household income. Our program has provided community improvements such as housing rehabilitation, sidewalks, accessibility ramps, and accessibility features to properties over the past five years. Additionally, up to 15% of the CDBG grant can be used to provide public services benefitting low-income people.






